Prayer & Worship - What

The worship that takes place in school is *Collective Worship*. A greater focus has been given to child led Collective Worship.

Worship in a Catholic school is far more than just a legal requirement. It is central to Catholic education and forms an essential part of the school's overall provision for prayer and worship and thus individual spiritual development.

Worship takes into account the religious and educational needs of all who share in it:

- Those who form part of the worshipping community in Church.
- Those for whom perhaps, school provides their main or only experience of Church.
- Those who may have experience of other Christian traditions or faith backgrounds.

Collective worship is an activity or experience:

- To which all can contribute
- From which all can gain
- At Key Stage 1 & 2 the children plan and prepare Collective Worship on a regular basis.

Catholic Collective worship will always have Christ at its heart reflecting the liturgical tradition of the Church.

Prayer and Worship - Why

In prayer and Worship we Praise, Ask, Thank and Say Sorry.

We recognise who we are: a Faith Community in the Home, the School and the Parish.

Prayer and Worship focuses on life as a whole school, as a community. It expresses what the school values. It is both religious and educational; a learning and worshipping experience.

Through Collective Worship, opportunities are provided for both children and staff to come together to worship God and specifically:

- To experience quietness.
- To be mindful.
- To use all our senses.
- To reflect on spiritual and moral issues.
- To build foundations of liturgical awareness.

- To develop and enhance community spirit.
- To respond to and celebrate life.

Prayer and Worship - Who

GIFT Team

In June 2014, GIFT Team (Pupil Chaplains) were commissioned by Bishop Terence Brain to lead prayer and worship within school. The children have raised funds and converted a room in school into a Chaplain Room that will be used for prayer and meditation by all students. The Chaplains are supported in their role by the Parish Priest, Mrs Webb and Mrs Clarkson.

The GIFT Team s have led services and supported the Year Three children in their Parish preparation for the Sacraments. They will in turn train and support younger pupils to take on the role as chaplains as they move onto high school.

Governors

Responsibility lies with the Governing Body, to approve a Policy for Prayer and Worship in the school, after consultation with the Head teacher.

Headteacher

The Head teacher's role, supported by RE Coordinator, is to ensure that collective worship is provided for each child every day.

Children

All children have an entitlement to take part in a daily act of worship.

Teachers

All staff have a duty to assist in the planning and delivery of meaningful acts of worship.

Parents

Parents have a focal supportive role to play and example to set and are encouraged to participate in school collective worship.

Parish Priest and wider Faith Community

The active participation of the Parish Priest and the Parish community in supporting aspects of Collective Worship is acknowledged by all.

'The family that prays together stays together.'

Prayer and Worship - When

Legislation does not require that Prayer and Worship takes place at a specific time. It does not necessarily have to occur at the beginning of the day.

The underlying philosophy of this policy is that the children are encouraged to acknowledge that:

We can pray anytime, anywhere, about anything.

Prayer and Worship is therefore, to be viewed as much broader that just formal acts of collective worship.

There is scope during the day for brief moments of reflection, which arise in connection with what the children are doing, for example, reading a story, a poem or within circle time discussions.

Many of these will be provided by the spontaneous reaction of children and staff to the wonder of God's creation.

In **October** and **Lent** the GIFT Team and children in KS2 are given the opportunity to lead the Rosary and Stations of the Cross in the morning from 8:45am. Staff, children and parents come and join this if they wish.

Prayer and Worship - Where

As a rule all main acts of Prayer and Worship will take place within the School.

In the Classroom

'Where two or three meet in my name I am there among them.'
(Matthew 18:10)

A class-based act of worship can provide an opportunity for teachers and their children to share a unique experience together. Children can be involved in a pro-active way.

In the School Hall

'Make a joyful noise to God, all the earth; Sing the glory of his name; Give to him glorious praise!' (Psalm 66:1-2)

The school hall can be transformed into a place of worship very simply by providing a focal point, based on symbol and imagery linked to the main these, alongside the provision of music for reflection. The hall can be made to feel special by the example set by staff and older children's entry and exit. We expect children to enter and leave the hall quietly.

Children are given opportunities to become involved e.g. in reading prayers, role playing etc to provide ownership of the act of worship.

In Church

At St Michael and St John's RC School we are very lucky to have the church next door to the school. Every term. through the school year, the school has the opportunity to attend and take part in Masses with the parish.

Prayer and Worship - How

Our aim is always to provide the children with a variety of meaningful experiences. Acts of Worship will therefore take place in many forms, including some of the following aspects:

- They can be led by the children, staff or visitors.
- They can be offered by a class, key stage, mixed group or the whole school.
- They can use a balance of quiet reflection, silence, prayers both prepared and spontaneous, responses, music, songs, hymns, dance, drama, poetry, readings both Biblical and secular, psalms and visual images.
- They can provide a focus using artefacts, candles, lighting and symbols.
- They can ensure that the theme, delivery, focus, length and resources are appropriate to the interests, age range and abilities of the children.
- They can set an appropriate atmosphere including a sense of reverence, order and occasion, including entry and exit.
- They can encourage the active participation of all present and support the overall precept of inclusion, where all are seen to be valued and cared for.

Prayer and Worship. Planning.

In line with the School Mission Statement, all staff at St Michael and St John's school are striving to develop the intended impact of their actions.

Planning:

- Takes place in consultation with all appropriate parties and with reference to school aims and policies. It includes cross-referencing the themes contained within the 'Come and See' scheme of work.
- Takes into account the Church's Liturgical Year, significant dates and Saints days.
- Takes into account the need for flexibility to respond to the changing situations within the school and wider community.

Format for Prayer and Worship

As a guide for planning classroom worship we use the titles of **Gather, Word, Symbolic Action** and **Mission**.

These are based on the parts of the mass.

Gather: We gather together at the start of mass.

Word: We listen to the Word of God during the Liturgy of the Word.

Symbolic Action: We receive the Body of Christ during the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

Mission: We live out God's word after mass in our daily lives.

Record keeping

Each class has a large A3 sized book to keep a record of each prayer and worship session. Children's prayers and reflections as well as photographs and readings may be put in as a record.

Prayer and Worship. Resources

In relation to the provision of relevant suitable resources to support the delivery of this Prayer and Worship Policy, the school uses Bible stories and SEAL materials.

In addition, we have a wide range of books, symbols, candles, coloured cloths, visual imagery and musical resources.
